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More than 1,300 Children and Their Families will Stop Receiving Vital Services Due to Proposed Budget Cuts to DHS and the Early Intervention Program

Issue: Early Intervention Services in DuPage County and Proposed Cuts in Illinois Funding

Critical Facts

- The primary goal of Early Intervention services is to support families in promoting their child's optimal development and to facilitate the child's participation in family and community activities.
- Eligible children and their families receive a variety of developmental, social-emotional, and health services that maximize their development. Services such as speech, language, occupational, and physical therapies, health services, and social work services are provided.
- The current level of eligibility for these services requires a 30% delay which enables children with moderate delays to qualify for services.
- Early Intervention services work, children with moderate delays make the greatest gains, nationally nearly 70% of children receiving Early Intervention services have greater than expected growth, and almost 50% of all children in Early Intervention leave the program functioning at grade level and do not require Special Education services when they start school.
- Early Intervention saves money by providing services and supports at an earlier age and reducing or eliminating the need for school based interventions. For every dollar spent on Early Intervention, \$7 is saved in later services.

The state budget that has been proposed by Governor Rauner would eliminate over 66% of children from this program. In DuPage County, this would mean over 1,300 children and their families would no longer receive this vital support. Local school districts would see a huge increase in the number of children needing Special Education Services straining already tight education budgets.
